Second Class of Fellows Complete Impactful Research on Matters of Free Expression and Civil Discourse Eleven renowned scholars and practitioners complete research exploring issues related to expression and engagement in college communities

Irvine, CA, August 27, 2020 – The University of California National Center for Free Speech and Civic

<u>Engagement</u> announced the completion of 10 unique research projects from its second class of fellows, designed to address issues that are central to advancing campus discourse and civic engagement in higher education and beyond. The fellows' research continues the Center's important work of helping educational institutions and communities foster environments that protect free expression, encourage activism and promote diversity and inclusion.

"We are proud of the research our fellows have conducted to explore timely and challenging questions related to the First Amendment and free expression in a variety of contexts," said Executive Director Michelle Deutchman. "Their exceptional work will contribute to a rich legacy in this area of study and will impact a variety of communities for the better—especially as educators, administrators and students navigate new challenges brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic."

The release of the projects marks the end of a year-long fellowship program with the Center. As part of their fellowship, each participant spent a week at one of the 10 UC campuses to dialogue with students, faculty, administrators and others to gather crucial insights that informed the educational materials and guides they created.
